

In this activity , children will discuss the relationship between people and different kinds of animals. For example, because cows are more tame, they can be kept on a farm, while tigers and other wild animals cannot.

You may want to discuss why some animals live on a farm (horses help farmers do work, cows give milk, hens lay eggs, etc.) and other animals may be kept in a zoo (they are wild and most people might not see and learn about them otherwise.)

**Direction: Cut and glue the pictures in the right box**

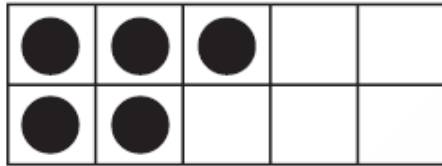


Color the cubes as instructed. Draw a line to the figure that has the same number. We have given an example.

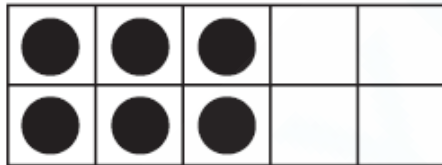
